This assignment is based on:

In well-written paragraphs, a total of approximately 600 words, please address the following question with detailed reference to the text:

• How does McLachlin describe "law" and "religion," and how does she characterize the way they relate to each other, or should relate to each other?

Your answer may also include 1-2 questions raised in the reading for further discussion.

As was the case for previous assignments, all your observations in the Text Preparation assignment should be backed up with references that allow your reader to see what they are based on in the text. For this purpose, please use <u>in-text parenthetical page references</u>—for an example of these, see Harvey, *Writing with Sources*, p. 51, under "MLA Basic Rules."

Since McLachlin also sometimes cites sources of her own, be sure to mention those sources when appropriate. Note that when you draw on a source cited within another source, you must give the full citation to the original source (e.g., in a footnote) "as cited in" the source in which you found the material.

<u>Note</u>: Since this is your first reading of this text, and since we have not yet discussed it in class, the Text Preparation assignment is simply a first effort at figuring out what it says, and doing it will help you get the most of our in-class work on the reading. Your fuller understanding will develop in the course of our class meetings, and with successive re-readings.
